

Course Summary:	This course will focus on what it takes to be a "Reasonably Well-Trained Probation Officer". It is designed to cover many issues which affect an officer's daily work life with the purpose of preparing that officer to better defend his/her conduct in the field and testifying in court when required. Content will include issues dealing with warrants and search conditions, what's reasonable vs. negligence, lawful arrests, use of deadly force, crimes by omission, specific intent & strict liability issues, guilty mind, current law updates.
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Performance Objectives:
A) Identify at least two amendments.
B) Identify at least eight exceptions to necessity of a warrant.
C) Identify five elements of a warrant.
D) Identify three elements of using deadly force.
E) Identify seventeen recent cases of dealing with search and seizure issues.
F) Identify at least three burdens of proof.
G) Identify ten areas of criminal procedure that will help him/her become a reasonably well-trained officer.
